# Crime prevention advice to keep your vessel and equipment safe this summer

### Remove it when not on-board

Have you:

- Removed your engine key from the ignition and locked your boat when no one else is on board, even for a short time?
- Removed personal belongings and kit (this includes life jackets and anything with your address on it)?
- Secured or removed the outboard motor?

### Checklist

- · Keep property out of sight and securely locked away. Never leave items on the deck or in the cockpit area
- Use strong padlocks or rim locks on entrances or hatches
- Fit anti-theft devices to outboard motors i.e outboard motor lock or round barrel locks
- Fit an alarm which can notify you that somebody is on board
- Mark your property by either engraving or painting your post code somewhere visible. Also, mark out of direct view with a UV pen, or by using DNA solution<sup>®</sup>.e SmartWater<sup>®</sup> or Select DNA
- · Keep curtains or shutters closed to prevent people looking inside the vessel
- · Make a list of serial numbers and take photos of all equipment
- Fit solar powered LED lights to deter criminals

Make sure your boat's security systems are well maintained and if something is broken, fix it or replace it as soon as possible.

## Remember, be a good neighbour

- Keep an eye on other boats as well as your own
- Report anyone suspicious at boat yards and mariners to the police or staff who are working there
- Don't give your gate code or gate pass to anyone
- Don't let strangers into a secure area, however genuine they may seem
